

The committee commends Jim Bradford who has been able to use the "Critical Issues..." report effectively in his contacts. Some legislators received the report and have had it read into the Congressional Record.

It was pointed out by the committee that we do not have 2YC_3 representative on the Division of Chem. Educ. Executive Committee.

This report was given by Kathy Weissmann for Jim Bradford who was unable to attend because of involvement with the ACS national meeting. She explained that Jim Bradford's duties have been expanded since he is now Manager of The Office of College Chemistry. Kathy described key points of the "Guidelines for Chemistry and Chem. Tech. Programs In Two-Yr. Colleges" which are now available. She urged everyone to review these guidelines and to return the evaluation of strengths and weaknesses. This document can be used as a model for chemistry departments. Five pilot visits have been made to four schools, and three more are scheduled. Site visits have been made to Southwest Texas J. Col., Uvalde, TX; Comm. Col. of Philadelphia, PA; S. D. Bishop State J. Col., AL; and SUNY Ag. and Tech. Col., NY. Visits are planned for Lane Comm. Col., OR; Anchorage Comm. Col.; and the Florissant Valley and Forest Park campuses of St. Louis Community College. Names of eleven members of the Task Force were listed.

Jim Bradford was commended for his effective use of the "Critical Issues..." report. Some 3600 copies have been distributed through the AACJC to all community college presidents and their board of trustees chairpersons. The report has also been read into the Congressional Record.

OLD AND NEW BUSINESS:

Edith Bartley announced that election ballots had been counted. Congratulations were then extended to John Clevenger who will serve as Chair-elect for 1988 and Chair for 1989.

Inquiries for the position of Treasurer should be submitted as soon as possible. Qualifications of applicants are needed by October 1. Ballots will be opened at the November meeting.

Martin VanDyke explained problems with travel arrangements from the Holiday Inn to meetings at Arapahoe Community College, and requested that persons with cars assist those without transportation. Persons planning on attending the Friday evening banquet are encouraged to stay on the campus.

ADJOURNMENT: The committee was adjourned at 11:10 a.m.

What are the most urgent issues and trends that community colleges must address as they plan for the future?

What elements of their own identity must community colleges strengthen or change as they plan for the future?

What bold message/advice -- vision, caution, point of emphasis, forgotten word, strategy -- would you offer the Commission as it contemplates the future of community colleges?

OPPORTUNITIES FOR TOMORROW IN SCIENCE EDUCATION

Mr. Chairman, Members of the Commission, Ladies and Gentlemen:

On behalf of the Task Force on American Chemical Society Involvement in the Two-Year Colleges, I thank you for this opportunity to provide information for your consideration as you plan for the future of America's two-year colleges.

Our country is rapidly falling behind other nations in meeting the challenges of worldwide economic competitiveness. Our scientific and technological developments, once the envy of the world, are no longer in the vanguard.

There is another problem of equal significance. Our nation is falling behind in its ability and willingness to deal with societal problems caused, in part, by developments in science and technology. Furthermore, dealing with these societal problems will require new technology—applied in a socially responsible manner—and new educational strategies to enable our population to take full advantage of the developments.

Because of their unique adaptability and responsiveness, our community colleges are in a position to make a significant and positive contribution to the solutions to these problems. However, unless several issues are appropriately addressed, our college science departments will be unprepared to meet the challenge before them.

Right now, our two-year college science departments are

- o frequently staffed with overworked faculty who have few opportunities for professional growth,
- o chronically plagued by inadequate laboratory and instructional equipment, and
- o inevitably faced with large numbers of underprepared students.

These critical issues must be addressed before our community, junior, and technical colleges can contribute to putting the United States back in the

forefront of world markets.

We respectfully suggest that this commission consider at least the following four concerns of the scientific and technological communities.

- 1) Public policy decisions, at all levels, and life, in all its facets, have rapidly increasing scientific and technological components. Unfortunately, this comes at a time when we have a dangerously low level of science literacy among policy makers and the general public. To improve the quality of public policy decisions and of life in all its facets, future two-year college science programs must contribute to the public understanding of science much more effectively than do our present programs.
- 2) Changes in demographics and in student interests have caused substantial decreases in our nation's peol of scientists and engineers. Unless we make some tremendous strides in attracting and retaining students in the sciences, we cannot hope to replace our existing cadre of technological workers. The scientific workforce of the future will not come from the traditional source—White males. There simply will not be enough students from this source. We must make great progress in attracting women and minorities into the sciences, and we must make progress in encouraging returning students to consider a career in the sciences. This pool of students—the population now best served by two—year colleges—represents our only hope of replacing our current scientific workforce. With appropriate assessment and placement programs, career counseling, and preparatory programs in which the science faculty participate, the community colleges can tap this vast, under utilized peol of talent.
- 3) The transfer of technology from scientific discoveries into technological developments creates a need for personnel educated to work with new technologies. Technological advances always require a greater level of scientific understanding, and they require training programs that are adaptable enough to incorporate new knowledge bases. These developments also require an updated faculty and modern equipment in the colleges to implement them to their fullest advantage.
- 4) The rapid advance of science and technology that will certainly characterize the future will create a great need for lifelong learning opportunities. The two-year colleges, because of their special accessibility and adaptability, can become the focus of a nationwide effort to keep our workforce up to date and our populace well informed for responsible citizenship in these aspects of modern life. Continuing education in the sciences and the science-based technologies will need to provide the workforce with constant opportunities to add to the framework of knowledge

addited during the years of formal education. Understanding the structure and behavior of nature (science) and how we control and reform nature to our benefit (technology) will not come from a one-shot, traditional academic preparation. The rate of scientific and technological advances in the future will mandate new approaches to science education both in the formal years of schooling and throughout life.

Each of these four concerns must be addressed in terms of faculty development, laboratory and instructional equipment needs, and curriculum and instructional strategies. It will do little good to initiate new programs for science education if there is not a substantial commitment to properly staffing and equipping these programs.

The American Chemical Society has been active in addressing the issues raised in this testimony. The reports of numerous conferences and workshops have been transmitted to the Futures Commission staff and will be available for your detailed consideration. We encourage you to especially consider the report, "Critical Issues in Two-Year College Chemistry," and work to implement the recommedations addressed to the National Science Board, the Commission on Postsecondary Accreditation, and to AACJC as well as other organizations. Because of the necessary limitations on time, we will provide additional, written testimony to this commission along with other supporting documentation. This additional information will present models for interorganizational cooperation, science education research in the two-year colleges, student-faculty research opportunities, regional alliances among two- and four-year colleges, partnerships with industry, programs for training K-12 science teachers in the two-year colleges, and the concept of a regional or local science development office.

Finally, we strongly recommend that you give as much consideration to the curricular areas of the sciences, the technologies, the humanities, and the social sciences as you do to the concerns of institutional organization, philosophy, financing, and governance as suggested in other testimony. It is not an overstatement to say that the economic future of the United States depends to a considerable extent on the directions two-year colleges take in their programming in the next decade.

Again, thank you for this opportunity to present our concerns. We stand ready to cooperate in any way you see fit as you undertake your critical assignment.

To be eligible for nomination for the office of Chair-Elect an individual must:

(a) be a two-year college chemistry teacher.

(b) have been a dues-paying member of 2YC3 for a minimum of three years prior to nomination.

(c) be a member of ACS and DIVCHED.

(d) have demonstrated leadership and organizational ability by serving as Chair or Co-Chair for a conference and in one or more of the following capacities:

(1) Served three years on the Executive Committee.

(2) Served as Local Arrangements Chair for a conference.

(3) Chaired a sub-committee.

(4) Contributed within the past three years in two or more ways such as: local industrial sponsor coordinator, chair of a conference section, paper presenter at a conference, moderated a panel at a conference and so on.

It is highly desirable that the Chair-Elect's college be agreeable to helping with certain expenses such as printing, mailing, telephone, typing and travel, during the three year period of committment.

Nominations for this office must include:

- (a) pertinent personal data such as name, college, job title, address and so on.
- (b) a statement of qualifications signed by the nominee.

(c) signed consent of the nominee.
