The meeting was called to order at 7:22 p.m. by the Chair, John Clevenger. James Knight reported that 25 persons were pre-registered for the conference. He presented updated information on the program, as well as lunch and dinner arrangements. Arrangements have also been made for the shuttle bus to operate between the motel and the College.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES OF THE 106TH CONFERENCE

Leo Kling moved, and John Clevenger seconded, that the minutes of the Executive Committee meeting at Louisville, Kentucky be approved as presented in the agenda book on pgs. 2-4. Voice approved.

POLICIES AND PROCEDURES

The Chair announced that two nominations had been received for the position of Chair-Elect for 1991. Ed Heath and Leonard Grotz, the two nominees, meet all the criteria for candidacy. The Chair will mail ballots to the members of the Executive Committee, in accordance with the policies and procedures.

OLD BUSINESS

Advertisements in the Newsletter

Leo Kling reported that he had checked with Truman Schwartz, Mary Virginia Orna, and Jim DeRose, none of whom could see any objection to the acceptance of paid advertising in our Newsletter. There is evidently no policy restriction on this practice. Leo Kling moved that we implement a policy of paid advertising. Seconded by Elliott Greenberg, and approved unanimously. Leo Kling will bring to the Boston Conference a written proposal for the rules and procedures to be followed in accepting paid advertising.

Budget

Elliott Greenberg presented the 1990 Budget for Duane Sell. It was moved (Elliott Greenberg) and seconded (Leo Kling) that the budget be approved and attached to the minutes. Unanimously approved.

Secretary/Editor

Leo Kling moved that we reactivate the position of Secretary/Editor, and open a search for candidates for this position. Seconded by Elliott Greenberg, and approved unanimously.

In accordance with the above motion, it was decided to announce the opening on the Executive Committee for the position of Secretary/Editor, in the Newsletter for the Boston Conference. The announcement will also note the expiration of Leo Kling's term as Industrial Sponsor Chair. Candidates for these positions will be invited to apply to the Chairperson by April 9, 1990.

Persons showing an interest in either of these positions will be sent a detailed list of duties for the position, together with a request for a resume of qualifications. The Executive Committee will review the applications at the Vancouver Conference, and shortly afterward determine the successful candidates by mail ballots, which will be opened and tallied at the Atlanta Biennial meeting.

Policies and Procedures - Duties of Executive Officers

In order to reflect the reactivation of the Secretary/Editor position, as well as current practices, it is necessary to revise the duties for the Executive Officers. Elliott Greenberg will draft the changes, and prepare separate sheets listing the duties for each officer. These sheets will then be sent to candidates expressing an interest in the various positions, when openings occur. It is to be recognized that this is only a superficial revision, and that sometime in the future it will probably be necessary to do a more thorough revision of the duties of these positions.

Long Range Planning

Further discussion on this subject was postponed.

DIVCHED Biennial Conference

Leo Kling reported that plans for the meeting are going very well. There is an impressive list of speakers and workshops on the program. Leo is currently working on plans for a 2YC₃ banquet and entertainment.

Leo Kling noted that the Biennial Conference would be at Georgia Institute of Technology on August 6-10, 1990, and briefly described the program. He asked for volunteers to help staff the 2YC₃ booth. Interested presenters should contact Leo. Arrangements are being made for 2YC₃ to sponsor a banquet on Tuesday evening.

Miscellaneous

John Clevenger noted the work of the SOCED task force and the "Guidelines" that resulted from this effort. He also mentioned that NSF has opened up instrumentation grants to two-year colleges, and that two-year college faculty are serving on the review panels.

As has been done at other conferences this past year, the Committee was asked to indicate their feeling about the desirability of a conference during the summer months. It appeared that conflicting schedules would leave only a narrow possibility in August, and this would probably conflict with the Biennial Conferences. There was a poor response in favor of a summer conference.

This report summarizes activities and conferences conducted by the Committee on Chemistry in the Two-Year Colleges (COCTYC) during 1989.

CONFERENCES. Our main activity was planning and conducting four regional Two-Year College Chemistry Conferences (2YC₃). For 1989 these were: 104th 2YC3, April 7-8, 1989, North Lake College, Irving, TX 105th 2YC3, May 19-20, 1989, Cerritos Community College, Norwalk, CA 106th 2YC3, Oct. 6-7, Jefferson Community College, Louisville, KY 107th 2YC3, Nov. 17-18, Mississippi Gulf Coast Community College, Gulfport, MS

These conferences were attended by over 400 two-year college faculty. By moving the conferences to each of four geographic regions during the year, we are able to provide professional development opportunities and contacts for many faculty with little professional development support. To do this, we depend heavily on the members of COCTYC in each region and outstanding efforts by our Program Chairs, Local Arrangements Chairs, and Local Industrial Sponsors Chairs. We are grateful for their support.

ELECTION INFORMATION. Margot Schumm of Montgomery College, Rockville, MD was elected 1990 Chair-Elect; she will serve as COCTYC Chair in 1991. Richard Jones of Sinclair Community College, Dayton, OH is the new Membership Chair, starting January 1, 1990. Both of them have had a positive role in two-year chemistry education for some time. We appreciate their willingness to help serve our organization. Nominations for 1991 Chair-Elect have been received and the ballots mailed. Ballots will be opened at our first spring meeting.

We are also asking for inquiries and nominations for the offices of Industrial Sponsors Chair and Secretary/Editor. We hope to review nominations for these offices at our spring meeting.

FINANCES. A summary of our income and expenses is shown below. It's important to note that no COCTYC funds were used to pay college or speaker expenses for these conferences. In addition, expenses for producing and mailing the 2YC₃ Newsletter were covered by the Chair's college.

GRANTS AND OTHER RESOURCES. At each of our conferences this year, we added a special presentation on grants and proposal writing, particularly for NSF's Instrumentation and Laboratory Improvement Program. At three of the conferences, we were fortunate to have staff from NSF participate in these sessions.

We also tried to expand and improve the Newsletter as a useful resource, in addition to giving future conference information. A survey conducted in Vol. 89-I of the Newsletter indicated general appreciation for what we were doing, but several respondents asked for more help for those not able to come to a conference. We've tried to respond in one way through the Newsletter.

NEW AND FUTURE DIRECTIONS. At each of our conferences, we continued our survey and ongoing discussion of how we can best serve two-year college chemistry faculty. One point that was reinforced was the great diversity in schedules and professional resources needed in various regions of the country. It became even more clear that we need to actively involve as many people as possible in our organization. We truly need the expertise of faculty in a region to plan and conduct the most effective conference for that region. We are highly dependent on these dedicated faculty for their ideas and help and must continue to seek ways to communicate with and involve all interested faculty.

CONTINUING ACTIVITIES. As mentioned, we publish four editions of the 2YC3
Newsletter each year. These are distributed to all two-year colleges and individual 2YC3 members. We encourage membership in the Division of Chemical Education and participation in its programs and activities. We also participate in the Society Committee on Education Task Force on ACS Involvement in the Two-Year Colleges.
