2YC₃ Southern Regional Advisory Board Meeting 114th Conference DeKalb College, North Campus Dunwoody Georgia Friday, April 12, 1991

Attendance

Thirty-nine names were listed on the attendance sheet. Thirty-eight attendees were 2YC₃ members. Eleven were Regional Advisory Board members.

Opening

The meeting was opened at 10:00 a.m. by the Chair, Margot K. Schumm.

Introductions

The COCTYC officers and past chairs present were introduced. All others then introduced themselves.

Minutes

The minutes of the 113th meeting, held at Phoenix College, Phoenix, Arizona were approved by voice vote.

Reports

- Margot Schumm presented a report on the 113th Conference at Phoenix, Arizona. The meeting was very successful. There were 154 people in attendance, 11 visitors, and 11 students.
- 2. Duane Sell presented the Treasurer/College Sponsor's report. Duane referred the members to the Statement of Income and Expenses, and the list of College Sponsors. As of April 12 there are a total of 98 college sponsors. There are 1,322 community colleges in the United States. Each member was asked to assist Duane in increasing college sponsor membership. The membership is \$25.00 per year which currently provides about 15% of the annual budget income. College Sponsor membership is important, however, it is more important for colleges to back 2YC3 by providing leadership and talent. College Sponsorships also provide good public relations for the college. A list of College Sponsors is included in the four regional meeting agenda books and one newsletter each year. An annual certificate of sponsorship is also given to each sponsor to hang in a prominent place on campus. This is one of the best p.r. values in the country. 2YC3 is beginning a contest to see who can bring in the most new college sponsors in the coming year. To enter the contest, participants must submit a minimum of 5 new sponsors. The winner will receive an award of \$100.00.
- 3. Dick Jones, Membership Chair, said 2YC₃ has a total of 507 paid members. Membership is also running a contest. There are approximately 3,900 full time community college chemistry faculty in the United States. Contestants must submit a minimum of 25 new members. The winner will receive \$100.00. An announcement of the contest will appear in the next 2YC₃ Newsletter.
- 4. Patricia McCoy-Brown, Industrial Sponsors Chair, encouraged members to support the exhibits in the lobby. There is also an Industrial Sponsors contest. The member recruiting the most new industrial sponsors, with a minimum of 3, will receive \$100.00. An industrial sponsorship costs \$100.00 per year, which entitles the sponsor to exhibit at each of the four regional conferences. At the moment there are twenty-four paid industrial sponsors. Packets will be sent to each industrial sponsor explaining benefits and procedures for exhibitors to follow at the four regional meetings.

5. Ed Heath, Chair-elect, said he is sending letters to the Site-Selection Committee Members to begin filling in the 1993-94, 1994-95, and 1995-96 conference sites in September. We hope to fill in most of these sites by November 8, 1991. The Site-Selection Committee Members are:

Role and Function of Advisory Boards

1. Primary Responsibilities of the Regional Chairperson:

The question was raised, does a regional chairperson have to be a member of DivCHED? It was the consensus opinion that the regional advisory board members must be members of 2YC₃, but the regional chairpersons must also be members of DivCHED.

- 2. Primary Responsibilities of the Advisory Board Members:
 - a. It was reemphasized that it is the consensus opinion of the members present that it is necessary for advisory board members to be members of 2YC₃, but <u>not</u> necessary that they be members of DivCHED. It is hoped that, with additional experience in 2YC₃, members will want to join DivCHED at some point in time.
 - b. It was recommended that an advisory board member be required to attend one regional meeting in their own region. The members agreed with the recommendation.
 - c. It was suggested that advisory board members should encourage conference attendance by encourgaging car pooling, and encouraging faculty that live near the conference to invite participants to stay in their homes for the duration of the conference. This would cut expenses drastically in these hard economic times and increase meeting attendance. The resulting professional friendships might also be beneficial. Another idea to increase meeting attendance is to call colleagues, invite them to travel with you, and, perhaps, share motel expenses.

Public Relations

People do not generally understand who the community college professor is and what this individual does. The COCTYC is seriously discussing the possibility of sponsoring a study defining various aspects of the community college experience as it relates to faculty, students, and the community, and disseminating this information to four year colleges, universities, funding organizations, and members of the community.

New Business

COCTYC is in the process of working toward increasing the funding of, specifically, chemistry programs, and, generally, science and math programs in two year colleges throughout the country. One effort to promote such an activity was a presentation to DivCHED by Margot Schumm. She asked the DivCHED to endorse a case study of NSF that reveals certain facts that are very supportive of community college efforts to receive funding for their science and math programs. COCTYC encourages two year college faculty to begin submitting grant proposals more frequently. 2YC3 is planning to continue conducting grant writing workshops at the regional conferences. Multiple grant sources will be listed in future newsletters. Members are encouraged to start sending proposals to various sources as soon as possible, and let the chair know of your successes.

Announcements

Duane Sell announced William Rainey Harper College in Palatine, Illinois has two vacancies in the chemistry department.

Introductions of Additional Arrivals

COCTYC Meeting 114th Conference DeKalb College, North Campus Dunwoody Georgia Thursday, April 11, 1991

Call To Order

Margot Schumm, Chair, called the meeting to order at 7:30 p.m.

Approval of Minutes of COCTYC Meeting, 113th Conference

The minutes of the COCTYC Meeting held at Phoenix College, Phoenix, Arizona were approved as written. Although not mentioned at the meeting, it should be noted that Dick Jones was inadvertently left off the Members Present list.

Summary Report of the 114th Conference

Judy Johnson, Michael Denniston, and Larry Little did not foresee any problems on the upcoming conference. Concern was expressed by the three conference organizers that they "re-invented the wheel" more than necessary. The conference packet was sent to the organizers very early, but it was not distributed to all organizers. It should be reviewed with the idea of formatting a checklist.

Personel Matters

- 1. **Election Outcome:** Duane Sell was unanimously re-elected Treasurer. Dave Klein was elected Chair-Elect. It was noted that, currently, there are a number of good people "in the wings".
- 2. **Job Description and Duties of the Officers:** There was a long discussion concerning the job description and duties of the Chair-elect, Chair, Immediate Past Chair, Editor, and Secretary, centering on the issues of continuity and reasonableness of the work load. The job description of the Regional Chairperson was modified, eliminating the section in item (f) and (g) "the Division or any other group of the ACS". The discussion on job descriptions will be continued at a future workshop.
- 3. Incoming Chair-Elect: Dick Jones made the motion to approve travel funds equal to one-half of the Chair-Elect travel funds immediately upon election. There was a second to the motion by Duane Sell. The motion passed unanimously.

Status of Case Study

- 1. **NSF Funding:** Margot sent the cover letter and case study on NSF funding to Dr. Luther Williams. She also stated the process by which the case study can be made a part of ACS policy.
- 2. Demographics vs. Success Study of Biology, Chemistry, Math, and Physics Programs in Two Year Colleges: Duane Sell moved that Margot contact discipline organizations in biology, math, and physics, send them a copy of the DivCHED Chemistry in the Two Year College study, and request input regarding their participation in a broad reaching study of demographics vs. success of biology, chemistry, math, and physics programs in two year colleges. There was a second to the motion; the motion passed unanimously.

Recruitment

- 1. Dick suggested a membership application be included in every 2YC3 newsletter.
- 2. By consensus it was agreed to conduct contests for recruitment of membership, college sponsors, and industrial sponsors. A minimum number of new members in each category will be set, i.e., 25 new members, 5 new college sponsors, 3 new industrial sponsors. An award of \$100.00 will be given to the winner of each category.

A contest announcement will be included in the next 2YC₃ newsletter. It must be emphasized in the announcement that renewals will not count; entries must be made up of new members in each category.

3. Encourage car pooling by members attending regional meetings in order to conserve travel funds and increase meeting attendance.

Profile of Community College Chemistry Programs, Faculty, Students, and Graduates - Development of an instrument that will provide an in-depth study of community college chemistry departments, faculty, students, and graduates

- 1. Formulate a specific list of items that need to be included in such a study and be prepared to submit this list at the Anne Arundel meeting.
- 2. Compile a list of possible funding sources for such a study; present this list at the Anne Arundel meeting.
- 3. Include facilities as a major category in the study.

Old Business - Long-range planning

- 1. Try to more evenly space regional meeting dates.
- 2. Item two under Status of Case Study and Profile of Community College Chemistry Programs should be categorized under long-range planning.
- 3. It was proposed that a summer retreat be conducted next summer (1992) in order to more thoroughly cover specific topics that can not adequately be discussed during COCTYC meetings.

New Business

- 1. Dick Jones reported that the NSF instrument workshop proposal, originally written by John Clevenger, has been rewritten and submitted to NSF. Dick asked the committee to pass a resolution that the COCTYC agree to offer at least one instrumentation workshop at each of the four regional meetings over the next five years beginning with the Fall 1992 Conference if the proposal is funded by NSF. The committee agreed unanimously.
- Duane Sell asked the committee to approve a new college sponsor's invoice form.
 Elliott pointed out the fact that the committee would be glad to make comments;
 however, it is not necessary for chairs to seek committee approval to initiate new or
 change old forms.
- 3. Kathy Weismann's brainstorming session summaries should be reported in the next newsletter.
- 4. It was decided to extend invitations to the Assistant Industrial Sponsors Chair and the Regional Chairs to attend all future meetings of COCTYC, and to send courtesy meeting packets to these individuals prior to each meeting.
- 5. We need to expend a greater effort to encourage minority college participation in 2YC3.

Adjournment

The meeting was adjourned at 11:08 p.m.

PUBLIC RELATIONS

The April 14th, 1991 edition of Parade Magazine included an article about two chemists, Nate Skinner and John Di Benedetto who have been presenting programs that demonstrate the wonder of science to elementary school children in California. Nate Skinner has been doing this for 17 years. Last year, he and John Di Benedetto founded a group called REACTS, Rediscovery Educational Activities Create Tomorrow's Scientist. The organization now has 100 volunteers, 10 of them chemists.

In my own state, Maryland, we have several projects of a similar nature, including programs, developed at a number of our Community Colleges, that reach both elementary school students and teachers.

Every meeting, ACS, DivCHED and 2YC₃, I have attended in the last few years has included papers and, in some cases, workshops dealing with programs, courses and special projects designed to make chemistry, and science in general, more appealing to students, teachers and the public.

Chem Com has been developed for high school students and Chem Source for high school teachers.

At the college level, we can find innumerable examples of courses specifically designed to present chemistry that is, to use a '60s term, relevant, meaningful, and challenging to students in nonscience curricula. At post secondary schools throughout the country, people are experimenting on ways to make the introductory chemistry course that science majors take more exciting and user friendly.

Funded by the Annenberg Center for Public Broadcasting, several chemical companies, and the ACS, a group of educators, including a Nobel Laureate, developed a college-level telecourse for liberal arts students. From this series, a complete package of films, text and teachers guides were derived to be used in high school courses.

How many of these developments have been reported in Chemical and Engineering News? Unfortunately, not many. I do not mean that there are no references to chemical education in C&EN, but I believe that it is not as broad-based as it should be. Judging from the letters to the Editor that appear all too frequently, few working chemists know much about what we are doing to change they way we teach chemistry, at all levels, in order to generate greater interest in chemistry and better understanding of the role that chemistry plays in all of our lives.

I am not the only person to voice this concern. The President of the ACS and many other chemical educators are equally concerned.

What can we do about this? While I do not claim to have *the* solution to this problem, I do have several suggestions. I am certain that many of you can add to my limited list, and hope that you will share them with me and others by writing to me or Ed Heath, who will be editing the 1992 Newsletters. Our addresses are given on Page 1.

- If you are doing anything that you feel is at all newsworthy, inform the Education Editor of C&EN, Ward Worthy and/or the C&EN Editor of the News Bureau closest to your school.
- Write letters to the Editor of C&EN, Michael Heylin, asking him to include more material
 about improvements in the delivery of chemical education from kindergarten to the
 university. (Perhaps we should also request that C&EN prepare a feature article that takes
 an in-depth look at Chemical Education in the '90s).
- Encourage your local Section to become more involved in matters pertaining to chemical education.

- Encourage your institution to publicize its science programs more aggressively in local news media.
- Encourage 2YC₃, Biennial and DivCHED meeting organizers to prepare press releases emphasizing the highlights of each meeting and to Invite the local press, and C&EN, to cover the meeting.

LETTER TO 2YC3

To the Editor:

In a recent newsletter, "Notes From the Chair," our chairperson's theme was "Now Is the Time". One aspect of this theme, to me, was asking that all of us, across the entire spectrum of the races, get more involved with educating our students in the sciences. This spectrum is represented to a limited extent on our college campuses but minority representation at the National ACS meetings, its workshops, its task forces, its divisions, and its committees takes a nose dive. Therefore, I would like to pose an obvious question. What can COCTYC and 2YC₃ do to get greater participation of all the races?

COCTYC is seeking answers to this question. Initial discussion could take place at the Fall 2YC₃ meeting at Anne Arundel Community College, September 27-28, 1991. I, like most of you have some obvious answers, but a serious discussion of these answers will probably be more effective. Thus, the Committee should extend an invitation to all who plan to attend the Anne Arundel meeting, especially minority members, to join them in discussing this question. I, as a minority member of 2YC₃, do not have all of the answers, therefore we need you, we need your intellect, we need your ideas, we need your suggestions and above all we need your presence.

Highlights of Activities
for the period
March 6, 1991 - August 16, 1991

College Chemistry

- Worked with DivCHED's 2YC3 to prepare the agenda for the 114th conference.
- Staff was invited to provide names to NSF of two-year college faculty in chemistry and chemical technology programs for a special NSF summer workshop designed to strengthen the Foundation's work with two-year colleges. The ACS report on "Critical Issues in Two-Year Colleges" was used as a prototype for the NSF workshop report.
- Staff made a presentation for the ACS Education Division at the Midwestern Local Section Officers conference. Student Affiliates/Local Section linkages were emphasized.
- Staff helped develop, sponsor, and conduct the Minorities in Science and Technology Network's Career Fair for junior and senior high school students in the DC metropolitan area.
- ACS Education Division cosponsored with ACS Professional Relations symposia at the Great Lakes and Middle Atlantic regional meetings. The symposia focused on faculty mentoring and careers for undergraduate and graduate students. Staff delivered papers on the Student Affiliates and career education services.
- Staff has served as liaison to the ACS Board Task Force on Minorities in the Chemical Sciences. The task force has been investigating ACS's and sister societies' actions and programs for recruiting and retaining minorities in science. Recommendations will be given to the Board by December 1991. Meetings have been held with AAAS, InRoads, the National Action Council for Minorities in Engineering, the Science and Engineering Alliance, and the Association of Puerto Ricans in Science and Engineering to explore the possibility of developing joint ventures.

Colleges Chemistry Consultants Service (C3S)

- The MSIP grant, with an award of \$112,212, began April 1, 1991. A meeting was held in Atlanta to launch the program. A presentation was made before ACS Corporation Associates to solicit their help in the partnership aspect of the project.
- Consulting visits have been made to two MSIP schools: Florida Memorial College and Johnson C. Smith University.
- Staff and the principals involved in the MSIP grant have seen working with the InRoads organization to establish partnershp programs at five demonstration sites across the country.
- The Office of College Chemistry sponsored consulting visits to two technical school systems in Wisconsin. The visits to Blackhawk Community College and the Gateway Technology College involved visits to four campuses.
- A proposal was developed and submitted to NSF's program for Undergraduate Faculty Enhancement. C3S intends to provide extensive training for the consultants, expand the roster of consultants to 100 experts, and subsidize consulting visits at twoand four-year colleges over the course of three years.

• One self-funded C3S visit was conducted over the period.

Chemical Technicians Programs

- An information session was held at the Atlanta meeting for chemical technology program experts who will serve as visitors to schools for the Chemical Technology Program Approval Service (CTPAS).
- Preparations were made to begin review for the first application submitted to the CTPAS.
- Staff conducted an informal survey of chemical technology programs that had expressed an interest in CTPAS. The primary finding was that schools are interested in the service and are in the process of completing the self-study as time allows.
- The third issue of Technicians Today, was published and mailed to over 400 subscribers.
- Numerous conference calls were held with Technicans Today staff for planning of the fourth issue of the magazine, and for developing a marketing strategy.

Chemistry in Context (CIC)

- The technical peer review of the textbook was completed.
- Fourteen sites representing different types of colleges, universities, and teaching situations were chosen for the field test of the second draft of CIC. Faculty from the fourteen sites met in Cortlnd, NY for a workshop in preparation of the field test.
- The CIC Editorial Board met twice to review and rewrite the draft of the text's first nine chapters. The Board also worked on developing three new chapters.
- The first four chapters of the second field test edition were published and distributed to the fourteen test sites, where nearly 1,000 students will be studying all or certain chapters of the text.

Career Education

- The teacher's guide for the ACS careers video, "Working It Out," was written and designed in mid-1991. The guide is being photocopied and distributed with each copy of the videotape that is purchased. The videotape targets minorities and is a tool that should help to attract and retain minorities in the science pipeline.
- Staff receives many requests for financial aid, a financial aid brochure, although slated to be eliminated, was updated and redesigned. Letters were mailed to all current publishers listed in the brochure, requesting that they update their information and return the forms to the ACS. Updated information, as well as new information was received.
- The publication "Chemical Careers in the Life Sciences" is now out of print (as of May 1991).

Student Affiliates

- The Student Affiliates poster session was held at the ACS national meeting in Atlanta. Sixty-seven students presented their research.
- The first Laboratory for Leadership (management training for Student Affiliates) was hosted by the SA Program. Fifty affiliates and advisors attended.
- The second issue (May/June 1991) of <u>In Chemistry</u> was published and distributed to approximately 6000 Student Affiliates, Faculty Advisors, and interested others.
- The updated 1991-93 edition of <u>Speakers and Tours for Student Affiliates</u> <u>Chapters</u> was printed and distributed to Faculty Advisors.
- The Student Affiliates Office arranged and hosted the Student Affiliates Faculty Advisor Workshop at the 21st Northeast Regional Meeting in Amherst, Massachusetts. Twenty-two advisors participated.
- Annual reports were returned by 249 chapters. Sixty of these reports were selected as candidates for Outstanding or Commendable awards.
- The Summer Special issue of <u>In Chemistry</u> was published and distributed to approximately 6000 Student Affiliates, Faculty Advisors, and interested others. This was the first issue to carry graduate school advertising.

Student Affiliates chapters were chartered at the following schools: The University of Tennessee at Knoxville; Hudson County Community College, Jersey City, NJ; The Technical Training Project, Inc., Newark DE; Edinboro University of Pennsylvania; and Belmont College in Nashville, TN

Student Affiliates chapters were reactivated at the following schools: The University of Alabama at Birmingham; Benedictine College, Atchison, KS; California Institute of Technology, Pasadena, CA; Drexel University, Philadelphia, PA; North Carolina Central University, Durham, NC; and Yeshiva College, New York, NY.
